Introduction


The Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) Wage Survey is conducted twice a year for the reference periods of May and November. Wage estimates in this publication are for May 2004. The all industry mean wage increased by 35 cents an hour from \$15.08 in November 2003 to \$15.43 in May 2004. However, rapidly increasing benefit costs appear to constrain wage growth as a larger proportion of compensation is allocated to pay health care premiums (see Figure i). Rising benefit costs also appear to have long-term effects on worker retirement income and employer profitability (Gallagher et al., 2005).

Occupational employment increased by 4,323 workers from November 2003 to May 2004. Occupations employing the largest number of workers include retail salespersons (7,890); cashiers (5,610); truck drivers, heavy and tractor-trailer (5,400); waiters and waitresses (5,390); and general and operations managers (4,960).

Occupational wage data are available at the multi-county regional level and for the two Metropolitan Statistical Areas, Casper and Cheyenne. Some occupations are published at the county level. Wage data are also published by industry. Detailed wage estimates and methodology of the survey can be found on the Department of Employment, Research & Planning website at http://doe.state.wy.us/LMI/OES_toc.htm.

Each state conducts an identical OES wage survey using standard techniques. This facilitates comparison of data among states, as well as comparisons with national figures. National and state wage estimates are located on the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) website at http://stats.bls.gov/oes/.


The Employer Benefits Survey is conducted quarterly. The benefit data in this publication include benefit cost estimates for 2003 and 2004. In 2004, 2,572 Wyoming employers were surveyed regarding the benefits packages they offer to their employees. Given current concerns over post-retirement income, it is significant that only a modest 45.5 percent of full-time employees offered a defined contribution retirement plan actually enroll in the plan, especially when an estimated 91.8 percent (of the 81.9 percent of full-time workers offered a retirement plan) are offered defined contribution plans (see Figure ii). These are plans where the plan contribution is known (e.g., 3% of total wages), but the eventual payout level is a function of the market and the types of financial investments in which plan contributions are held. Defined contribution plans tend to be jointly funded (72.9%) by employer and employee (see Section II, Table 11, page 24).

Defined benefit plans are offered to fewer workers (30.7% of the 81.9% offered a retirement plan) but the percentage of employees choosing to enroll is much higher (92.3%; see Figure ii). The lower instance of offering may be due, in part, to the apparent large share of situations where the employer is the only contributor to the plan.

Employer benefit data have been collected in Wyoming since 1999. There is presently no national program that collects information on employer-provided benefits that would produce localized estimates of benefit costs to employers or provide workers with information about the availability of benefit packages. The BLS conducts the National Compensation Survey, which produces comprehensive data on the incidence (the percentage of workers with access to and participation in employer-provided benefit plans) and provisions of selected employee benefit plans for the nation as a whole. Glossary

Defined Benefit Retirement Plan - A retirement plan using a specific formula to calculate the employee's future benefit amount. In the private sector, defined benefit plans are typically funded by the employer and paid as a lump sum. The employer specifies the amount of the contribution and interest rate required to reach a predetermined amount at retirement.

Defined Contribution Retirement Plan - A retirement plan with set contribution amounts. The future benefit amount fluctuates based on the investment earnings and the total contributions at the time of retirement. Typically, employers contribute a set amount or match part or all of the amount contributed by the employee.

Entry Level Wage - Mean of the lower one-third of the wage distribution; experience level not determined as part of the survey.

Experienced Level Wage - Mean of the upper two-thirds of the wage distribution; experience level not determined as part of the survey.


